MISSION STATEMENT

Recovery Support Committee

Goals and Objectives for 2015

Our goal is to create an evidence-based recovery culture by using community recovery support services as an alternative to jail, prison, or residential treatment. We hope to work collaboratively with the judicial system, probation and parole, substance abuse treatment and mental health providers, and the faith-based community to support individuals in recovery.

Objective 1: Distribute and share information in the recovery support resource directory. The resource directory covers a number of areas needed by those in recovery who may be coming out of community treatment, the judicial system, or who have never sought community services.

Objective 2: Expand our committee support to enhance recovery support services in Region 6.

Objective 3: Advocate for additional community support such as housing for men and women, education and job training, classes for social and cognitive skills, and resource coordination.

Objective 4: Support and encourage training for area churches and clergy who are working with individuals in recovery.

Objective 5: Continue collaboration-building and education within our community

- We have a high regard for the improvements to the recovery culture which have come about through the efforts of problem-solving courts and other innovative programs.
- We will collaborate with the judicial system on providing recovery support for those in the court system.
- We will share information with the community on options which may be less costly and more effective for individuals needing recovery support.

Objective 6: Advocate for a community-wide recovery support plan based upon evidence-based research.

Objective 7: Continue looking for effective alternatives to prison, jail, and residential treatment when appropriate to save money while still providing effective support for those seeking a life of recovery.

Public Health Department Responsibilities:

- A. PHD will comply with the rules, regulations and policies as outlined by the DBH and rules, regulations and policies pertaining to BHB as outlined in Idaho Statutes 39-3132, 39-3133, 39-3134, and 39-3135.
- B. PHD shall ensure that procedural safeguards are followed in confidentiality requirements according to IDAPA 16.05.01, Use and Disclosure of Department Records.
- C. PHD agrees to support the goals and objectives of the DBH in the establishment of readiness and maintenance of BHBs under 39-3132.
- D. PHD will manage personnel, operational and support tasks as stated in the Scope of Work, under the DBH contract.
- E. PHD will not be responsible for services that are not funded or outlined within the Scope of Work under contract with the DBH.
- F. PHD will participate with the BHB in the budget development process.
- G. PHD will participate with the BHB in identifying service gaps and contract opportunities.
- H. PHD will provide the BHB with assistance in the development of the Gaps and Needs Analysis report to the State Behavioral Health Planning Council (SBHPC).
- I. PHD will collaborate on joint projects or initiatives that fit within the scope of the BHB, including but not limited to grant opportunities pursuable by PDH.
- J. PHD will provide behavioral health integration expertise and resources from the regional Behavioral Health Board, where available, and/or through the IDHW Division of Behavioral Health, IHC Behavioral Health Integration Workgroup, or existing resources in the Regional Collaborative (RC).
- K. PHD agrees to meet bi-annually with the R4BHB and DBH to ensure ongoing alignment and compliance with this MOA.

Behavioral Health Board Responsibilities:

- A. BHB will advise the SBHPC on behavioral health needs for adults and children within region/district.
- B. BHB will advise the SBHPC on progress, problems and proposed projects of the regional/district service.
- C. BHB will promote improvements in the delivery of behavioral health services and coordinate and exchange information regarding behavioral health services in the region/district.
- D. BHB will develop an annual Gaps and Needs Analysis assessment of behavioral health services for the region/district.
- E. BHB will assist the SBHPC with planning for service improvements.
- F. BHB will report annually to the SBHPC, the DBH and PHD the progress being made toward building a comprehensive community family support and recovery support system that will include performance and outcome data.
- G. BHB will establish and maintain a children's mental health subcommittee.
- H. BHB will work actively to build and support community support and recovery support services within the region/district.
- I. BHB will follow all Idaho Code requirements for board membership as stated in 39-3134.
- J. BHB will meet bi-annually with PHD and DBH to ensure ongoing alignment and compliance with this MOA.
- K. BHB will participate as a part of the PHD Regional Collaborative stakeholder group to act as a behavioral health consultant and advisory entity on the role of behavioral health in the community and in patient centered medical homes.

Department of Behavioral Health Responsibilities:

- A. DBH will commit to annual funding of \$50,000 for the life of the contract which will be established at 4 year intervals.
- B. DBH will provide federal grant writing support for efforts agreed upon by the BHB and the PHD.
- C. DBH will write and submit those grants that are agreed to by the BHB and PHD that can only be submitted through the DBH.
- D. DBH will meet bi-annually with the BHB and PHD to ensure ongoing alignment and compliance with this MOA.

Ross on Vacation this week. Start with Regional updates on BHB progress:

REG 7:Randy: Kathy Skippen has been working with them on the contract. Goal is to partner with the Health district by Sept. 17th. They are in their final draft of an MOA. Randy will send a final draft document to Kathy.

QUESTIONS ANSWERED: There is no one time start-up of funds. If a contract is signed as an example on Oct.1, 2015, the contract year will continue through Sept. 30, 2019. Probability that each Region will have a different start date. WEBSITES will be handled by the prospective Health District if partnering with them, but remain with DHW otherwise until BHB is stand alone. DHW will maintain links on their BHB webpage to direct traffic to the correct website.

REG 6: Michelle: Their Region is leaning toward partnering with their Health District and will be meeting with them on August 17th. Their BHB is also in the process of discussing annual goals.

REG 5: Erica: Currently working on a draft MOA between their board and their Health District. They are starting to meet at the Health District office and the next meeting is on the 27th of July.

REG 3: Chuck: Looking at the final version of the contract to partner with our Health District and will be presenting it to the HD board. *Discussion on use of board funds to create a webpage.*

REG 2: Darrell: Met with our Health District a month ago, but they are really looking for a sales pitch.

REG 4: Laura: Contract with the Health District is going well and they are working on transitioning
Jess: The Executive committee is looking at if a MOU is necessary.

ASSOCIATION OF COUNTIES Meeting: Kathy said the District 3 meeting (our Regions 3 & 4) will take place with DHW and the agenda will include discussion on SHIP, Transformation, and our Director discussing the Medical Home. Medicaid Expansion questions may be directed to the Director as Legislature had stated they will not deal with Medicaid Expansion this year.

RECOVERY CENTER UPDATES by Regions:

REG 4: Laura: things are evolving and moving along nicely, and dealing with the bumps in the road along the way. Kathy mention Ross attended the Grand Opening which was packed and said it had real feeling.

REG 2: Darrell: Moving along and prepared to open in early September. The facility is identified and we have furniture. Currently working on policy. *Questions on how to find a location for a Recovery Center and discussion on challenges in each region.*

REG 3: Heather: Canyon County Recovery Center is hoping to open the doors by Oct. 1st of this year. Currently working to secure volunteers and Recovery Coaches, and hire staff.

KATHY mentioned that data collection is important to help sustain funding and to help other regions establish centers. Recover Idaho will be the lead on data collection. Questions on any help needed for Recovery Center start-up should be directed to Kathy.


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Hotline Report for April-June 2015

Calls received by out of state callers with 208 area code cell phone numbers are handled like calls from Idaho until the initial crisis is resolved; then the phone worker performs a "warm transfer" connecting the caller to their nearest Crisis Center if appropriate or provides referrals.



Staff

The hotline operates with 6.17 FTE's, an Americorps volunteer acting as Outreach Coordinator about to enter her 3rd year with the hotline, and has 3 interns set to begin this Fall. We continue to seek qualified clinicians interested in giving back to the community to volunteer their time as backup phone room supervisors, and also seek interns from counseling, social work, psychology or related programs. ISPH offers high quality, relevant training and experience and excellent networking opportunities.

Volunteers & Training

Our next Phone Responder Training begins October 3, 2015! All persons interested in volunteering for ISPH should contact Volunteer Coordinator Nina Leary at 208-258-6992.

ISPH graduated its largest ever class of 22 Volunteer Phone Responders in May and currently has 65 active volunteers on the phones. Three 5am to 9am phone shifts are staffed by volunteers this quarter as we work toward our goal of volunteers answering all calls at least 20 hours per day, 7 days a week. (Most of our overnight phone coverage continues to be provided by paid supervisory staff as we recruit and train more responders).

This quarter volunteers contributed a total of 3,421 hours, for an approximate in-kind value of \$59,062. ISPH has trained 140+ volunteers since launch. Our recently expanded curriculum of 45+ hours includes a full day of communication skills and the 2-day Applied Suicide Intervention Skills Training (ASIST). All volunteer phone shifts are supervised by a master's level clinician or equivalent.

Facilities

ISPH continues to operate its crisis phone room, conduct smaller-scale volunteer trainings, and distribute outreach materials from its offices provided by the Lion's Club Sight and Hearing Foundation, for an in-kind value this quarter of \$2,700.

Crisis Text & Chat Response

ISPH plans to incrementally implement crisis text and chat response in the Fall of 2015 and will bring Molly Brack from Contact USA (our accrediting body) to Boise to train hotline staff in this specialized form of crisis response on July 15.

Hotline Data Capacity

ISPH Phone Responders ask but do not require, that callers provide non-identifying demographic information to help ISPH assess its' statewide reach and impact and identify trends in call volume. Please direct requests for statistics related to caller demographics, to jreusser@jannus.org with "request for Hotline statistics" in the subject line. If your agency receives an email from noreply@icarol.com on behalf of the Hotline it is not junk mail but a request from ISPH volunteers to either confirm or update listing info. If you are a provider,



contact Outreach coordinator Nancy Pounds (npounds@jannus.org) to have your listing added to our database.

Outreach

- Hotline staff and volunteers provided training, presentations, and outreach to many organizations this quarter, including CIT training, NNU, health fairs, art walks and Boise Pridefest. ISPH held 2 Ambassador trainings for individuals wishing to represent the hotline at community events and speaking engagements, with plans to expand these trainings to East and North Idaho. We seek committed, personable individuals statewide who support the mission of ISPH to join our Ambassador Corps and help raise awareness of this vital program.

Staff and volunteers have distributed over 2,000 wallet cards and other outreach materials throughout the state this quarter.

Sustainability for ISPH continues to depend upon robust public/ private partnerships. Hotline operations require a diverse and varied mix of partner and funder investment in this vital statewide service. Staffing and budget plans for year 3 include an increasingly robust mix of paid and volunteer supervisory staff and efforts to recruit volunteer phone workers for overnight shifts and expanded, assertive exploration of grant opportunities.

Advisory Board

The ISPH Advisory Board conducts monthly conference calls to discuss strategic program goals related to outreach, operations and fundraising. The next in-person Board meeting is scheduled for September. ISPH continues to seek Advisory Board representation from Southeastern Idaho and members with fund development expertise.

Plans for the Next Quarter

Top goals for the Hotline's next quarter of operation are: training our 10th volunteer Phone Responder class, initial implementation of crisis text & chat response, revamping our resource database, broadening advisory board membership, continuing to increase outreach and volunteer recruitment efforts, continuing to provide follow up calls to discharged emergency department patients in partnership with the Saint Alphonsus Boise Regional Medical Center, expanding our Volunteer Outreach Ambassador program, and continuing to seek a broad base of sustainable funding.



Motivational Interviewing clinical Training

Motivational interviewing is a form of collaborative conversation for strengthening a person's own motivation and commitment to change. It is a person-centered counseling style for addressing the common problem of ambivalence about change by paying particular attention to the language of change. It is designed to strengthen an individual's motivation for and movement toward a specific goal by eliciting and exploring the person's own reasons for change within an atmosphere of acceptance and compassion.

As a social worker he recognizes the importance of taking an individualistic look at how those issues affect each of us. Craig was introduced to Motivational Interviewing early on in his career and is a member of the Motivational Interviewing Network of Trainers (MINT). He's had the opportunity to utilize MI in clinical settings as well as in his various supervisory positions. Craig graduated from the University of Utah and recently relocated to East Idaho where he works for the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare.

Craig currently trains for the Prevention Research Institute based out of Lexington KY. Through PRI he provides training for various human services entities in the States of Colorado, Maine, North Carolina, Alaska, Georgia Utah, Montana and Tennessee, the US Coast Guard and the US Army. He has trained at conferences such as the CADCA National Forum in Washington DC, the Utah Fall Conference on Substance Abuse and Prevention, The June School on Substance Abuse, The National Homeless Summit and has served as an invited panel member at the Governor's Health Summit in Salt Lake City. Craig has trained for various organizations such as Volunteers of America, Peer Court, the Salt Lake City Mayor's Coalition, the SPF-SIG Coalition, and student body leaderships in various regions in the West.
